For over 30 years, Susan has worked in management positions for Republic Services, and currently as the Division Municipal Business Manager where she is responsible for contract compliance, community donations, and being the liaison to cities and counties. Susan also worked in government with the Alameda County Board of Supervisors and the California State Legislature.

As a founding member of the Elderly Wish Foundation and as a supporter of many programs that benefit seniors, Susan brings to the MOW Diablo Region Board a deep understanding of the challenges facing seniors and the importance of preventing food insecurity.

MOW DIABLO REGION Cafés meet many needs

Meals on Wheels Diablo Region keeps seniors who are not homebound nourished and engaged at its seven Cafés throughout the county. Hosted at local senior centers and recreational facilities, the Cafés offer a warm, welcoming environment where seniors can enjoy a nutritious, well-balanced lunch and participate in activities like crafts, bingo, and holiday celebrations.

Many seniors have outlived their siblings, spouses, and close friends, and some have even outlived their children. The loneliness and social isolation they experience creates a significant emotional and physical health risk. According to the World Health Organization, the mortality effects of isolation are comparable to smoking 17 cigarettes a day.

The Cafés address isolation head-on by providing a safe environment for seniors to connect with others and form meaningful relationships. Dan O., a longtime regular at the Walnut Creek Café, said he was lonelier before he started coming to the Café for lunch every day. In fact, he now encourages his neighbors to join him, even offering rides to folks who don't drive anymore.

Good Food, Good People

Volunteers and managers form close bonds with the Café regulars, often going above and beyond to ensure their well-being and create a supportive, welcoming atmosphere. Maria Perez, the Pittsburg Café Manager, checks in with any regulars who don't show up for lunch. She also celebrates Café clients' birthdays with cake. These small acts of kindness give rise to a strong sense of belonging and support that some older adults may not experience otherwise.

"There's good food, good people," says Café client Robert W. "It's a luxury for us seniors. I wish more folks knew about this program because there are a lot of older people who are lonely or hungry when they don't need to be."

During extreme heat, the Cafés also serve as cooling centers, providing safe, comfortable spaces to escape the high temperatures. On one of the summer's hottest days, NBC Bay Area News visited the Pittsburg Café and spoke with Nutrition Manager Fern Fonseca. She explained that many of the Cafe's clients live without air conditioning and would be at risk of heat-related illness without options like those offered by Meals on Wheels Diablo Region's Cafés.

Volunteers At The Heart

Volunteering at the Cafés offers the chance to build deeper connections. Many of the volunteers are seniors themselves. Maddie M. likes to volunteer at the Rodeo Café because she gets so much from the experience. "I have no family left. It's just me. These folks here are my family now, and they treat me like family, too."
